The League of Women Voters of Oregon would like to publicly express our support for the proposed Smith River National Recreation Area Expansion Act, a concept similar to S. 2875 from 2020, which we also supported, to protect the North Fork Smith River watershed in Oregon.

The North Fork Smith River has unique scenic, historic and recreational values. The League of Women Voters of Oregon believes that water is a resource that should be managed for the benefit of the public and as a sustainable habitat for all life forms. The League supports policies and statutes that promote comprehensive long-range planning for conservation and management of ground and surface water and the improvement of water quality.

The North Fork Smith River and its tributaries support several imperiled fish species including Southern Oregon and Northern California Coast coho salmon, which are listed under the Endangered Species Act as threatened. Other species that depend on this river system's clean cool water for survival include steelhead trout, Chinook salmon, and coastal cutthroat trout.

Fishing, kayaking, and white-water rafting folk from across the nation flock to the Smith River system, including the North Fork Smith River in Oregon, to paddle and float its clear waters. Camping, swimming, and hiking also draw thousands to this watershed. These recreational activities support local community economies. This river's crystal-clear pure waters are central to its recreational attraction.

The downstream communities of Gasquet, Hiouchi, Smith River and Crescent City all rely on the Smith River for clean drinking water and agricultural use.

We support the Smith River National Recreation Area Expansion Act. We believe this expansion is necessary to maintain its extraordinary water quality and ecological values and to provide rural fishing and recreation jobs for this shared special place in Oregon and California.

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
